Local Man Retires, **Heads LDS Mission**

J. Stuart McMaster, Brigham City resident and regional solicitor, Department of the Interior, was presented with an award of \$1,000 for superior service at retirement dinner given in his honor Tuesday at the University of Utah panorama

The award was presented by Raymond C. Coulter, Deputy Solicitor, Washington, D.C. on behalf of Solicitor Mitchell Melich in recognition of Mr. McMaster's service as legal advisor for the Department of the Interior extending over a period of more than 36 years. stated. He has been instrumental in the preparation of legislation for and the creation of water conservancy districts in Utah, Nevada, Colorado, Wyoming, and New Mexico. He wrote repayment contracts on Federal reclamation projects in many of these states and advised and counseled in interstate compact matters for the development, utilization, and conservation of water in the West. During his career he has directed the legal work necessary for the construction of such dams as Glen Canyon and Flaming Gorge.
