Logan 5th Wins '51 Hoop Title

AT 10:35 Saturday night, and exactly 15 seconds before the end of the championship game between Logan Fifth Ward and Salt Lake City Thirty-third Ward and with the score tied at 41-41 for the first time since early Wednesday afternoon a deep solid silence fell over the University of Utah Fieldhouse.

Anxiously team members lined up on the keyhole, the referee announced "One shot," and then handed the ball to Jack Clark. The crowd held its breath while the charity shot sailed through the air, for the 1951 M Men Tournament championship title went with this toss.

Clark made it!

And Logan Fifth's fans went wild. How many thousands more witnessed the thrilling finish in the comfort of their own homes via television can only be estimated.

SIXTEEN TEAMS, the best out of 800, representing the 14 MIA athletic divisions of the Church stakes, for four days raced up and down the huge floor of the Fieldhouse playing their hearts out trying to win the championship of the big-gest basketball league in the world in which 10,000 young men had entered six months ago last October.

When it was all over and the handsome trophies were being awarded to the winners in the colorful after-the-game ceremonles, it was discovered that the six top teams were all from Utah, an unusual circumstance






