6:32 Dan Dugan, District 6 City Council Representative monthly report

- Utah voting day is Tuesday, 11/21, which is two weeks later than prescribed to provide extra time to give candidates time to prepare for the special election to replace Chris Stewart.

- With redevelopment in the city, gentrification is displacing Salt Lake's population. The SLC Council is developing the *Thriving in Place* plan, which will strive to reduce homelessness and prevent residents' displacement, and provide resources that would allow them to remain housed. - Affordable housing remains a thorny problem. Today's household needs two incomes to afford an average home. Insinuating 2-, 3-, and 4-plex multi-family dwellings into the city's existing R-1 (single-family dwelling) neighborhoods would change their character forever and may not be the answer. Likewise, allowing oversized ADU's could impact our neighborhoods. - The City provides resources for those experiencing homelessness.
  - They have installed temporary structures to provide a tiny house for 50. Each resident is vetted by the city, and the site is managed for security, maintenance, etc. Learn more at:

  - They are collaborating with the State and other local jurisdictions to expand resources statewide. They've provided \$4M in grants for improvements for 291 beds in two facilities in the city that provide community and behavioral health care for seniors and other age groups at risk of homelessness.   - They are working with the Volunteers of America who is requesting Conditional Use approval for a new clinical detoxification/recovery facility that will serve 165 teens and young adults as described here: <u>https://www.slc.gov/planning/2022/01/21/volunteers-of-america-voa-detoxification-clinic-conditional-use-for-a-large-group-home/</u>
- Regarding a proposed parking lot at Guardsman Way, it has been determined that the University of Utah owns the property, and they are entitled to build the parking lot on it if they choose.
